#### **Summer Sounds**

In Leeds, from Memorial Day til the 4th of July, The evenings are at their longest. Taking advantage of this, particularly on those warm, still nights, offer lots of opportunities to listen for life that oddly enough speaks to silence.

A recent Sunday especially spoke to this as a mottled sky drifted off in a southwest direction--Sunday, of course, the best of summer evenings in Leeds as the traffic is calm and the light gentle. Take a walk up to Reservoir Road and what will you hear?

The robins seem to be the last of the birds to settle down for the night--with a call somewhat happy. While the robin is the last heard, its the catbird that's latest to bed--its slate grey body still dashing through secondary growth. Tree frogs and crickets--one high and the other low-echo their calls; annoying to some and so soothing to those most fortunate.

Stop long enough along the edge of the Upper Reservoir and you just might hear the sounds of mergansers, a late feeding great blue heron (headed for the rookeries of the Meadows) or even the chirping of high flying chimney swifts--ever the aerialist. The much maligned mosquito may be buzzing your ears as you stop and take in such pleasurable Leedians sights but don't be deterred.

On nights of silence, stillness and seemingly eternal light, the sounds of a distant dog barking, two motorcycles, a screen door closing, or best of all, children laughing only put an exclamation point to late evening sounds that highlight our long May-June nights in Leeds.

Whether it be Reservoir Road or any other special spot you have in Leeds, take time to hear it. Even that late night thunderstorm that breaks up the silence and the heat, as loud as it is, speaks to the length, the warmth and the beauty of this time. Should you miss it though, come 4:30 am or so, in Leeds there's apt to be that cardinal or

wren singing at your window. Take it as your cue....
